“ My Aunt Pearl, my mother's sister, was the youngest of ten siblings, who have all passed before her. Born in East Taylor, Pennsylvania, she grew up in Greenpoint, Brooklyn, NY. Single all her life and fiercely independent, she was also generous to a fault, and "never met a stranger" as Laretta described her. She lived at three different addresses, all within a half mile from each other with her also always single brother Andy. Within 2 miles was Church, and work for 36 years at the Pfizer plant in Williamsburg, Brooklyn. I would always visit them every summer, till my own summer jobs. She took me to my first Chinese restaurant, to Radio City Music Hall to see the Rockettes at Christmas. We went to Broadway plays and shopping in Manhattan. Aunt Pearl had all the best and latest clothes styles, loving to shop at Macys and Bloomingdales. She let me raid her closet and keep whatever I liked because she was always on to the next thing. She was fascinated by new things-clothes, appliances, all the latest gadgets-electric typewriters, personal computers, printers, cell phones. Although she would get very frustrated when they did "not work right"! I

had the pleasure of living with her and my uncle when I was a financially strapped Physical Therapy student in Brooklyn in the mid 1980s. They were always fussing with each other, it was always best to talk with them separately, preferably when the other one wasn't home! Their "parenting" ideas from the 1940s were a bit trying for my 22 year old, been away at college for 4 years, self. But I would not have made it through that time, my first year of work, and moving into my own apartment (Uncle Andy never understood why I would want to do that!) without their generosity and selflessness. When Uncle Andy became very ill, living in a nursing home in NJ, she agreed to move to Virginia in 2004. My mother was living here, near me and my husband in Newport News, my Dad having passed in 2003. There was no way the two sisters would ever consider living together, having driven each other crazy the two weeks they did, before we got Pearl her own place! She never looked back and embraced her life in Virginia, first in Newport News and then in Hampton. Being a "city girl" who used public transportation all her life (although there was that short time in the early 1960s she learned to drive, bought herself a black Pontiac convertible with red leather seats, and gave up driving after her car accident!), she adapted very quickly using the bus lines at first and Handiride later. She learned the whole Peninsula area, spending most of her day doing her favorite things-eating out and shopping. She also took a charter bus to a casino in Delaware for an overnight, twice! When her physical health started making her favorite activities more difficult to do independently, she very unwillingly and very mad at me, went into Assisted Living. I had peace of mind that someone would know where she was at all times and keep her safe, but she was having none of that "Assistance" part. She regularly would still eat out and go shopping but suffered through it with the private aide that drove her everywhere. Before my mother passed away in 2013, an angel named Laretta Crawley took care of her. After, she asked if she could help me with anything, well..Laretta, having been strongly warned by me and told she could change her mind anytime, took Pearl into her home outside of Richmond. She took care of her 24/7, even when her husband after more than three difficult months in the hospital passed away. She told me Pearl was a comfort to her in those days following his death. Laretta, you and your family gave Pearl what she sorely needed, peace and care she had not known since her mother passed in 1957. You all are forever in her family's debt. God Bless You All. Pearl is survived by 4 nieces, 6 nephews, 11 great nieces, 9 great nephews, many great-great nieces, nephews. I Love You, Aunt Pearl!!
