He would wear a 25 lbs vest around the field and dare us to catch him. He made us line up and do wind sprints that made our legs hurt so bad we could barely walk the next day. And just a few years ago, while visiting my son, I looked him up in Virginia and we shared a couple beers and a round of golf. Scott touched my life over 50 years ago.
